CHRISTOPHER COLUMBUS ESSAY RUBRIC

Directions: Throughout this unit, we have studied and evaluated MANY different topics. Now you will have the opportunity to demonstrate your learning as we close out this unit. <u>This essay option requires you to evaluate</u> whether or not Christopher Columbus was a hero or a villain. During class today, you will write a 5 paragraph essay determining whether or not you believe Columbus was a hero or a villain, using sources provided in class and ones you found on your own (refer to the annotated bibliography assignment). Use the rubric to guide you in your writing. You will write this essay on google docs and share it with the teacher. You must grade this rubric and submit it to the teacher. We expect you to take ownership of your work, self-assess, and reflect on how you performed.

If you have selected this essay option, you may use your annotated bibliography and corresponding sources from that. You are not permitted to talk during this essay. Listening to peaceful, uplifting music is permitted so long as it does not distract those around you.
