# U.S. TERRITORIES AND THE DISTRICT OF COLUMBIA

n addition to the 50 states, the U.S. has five territories gained through conquest or treaty.

Puerto Rico and Guam, for example, were captured from Spain after the Spainish-American War of 1898.

Each of these territorial possessions today is legally classified as "unincarparated." That is, each belongs to the U.S. but is not a part of (has not been incorporated into) the nation, as is each of the 50 states. Most U.S. possessions have been granted a considerable measure of self-

government. Puerto Rico, for example, is part of the U.S. for the purposes of international trade, foreign policy, and war, but has its own separate laws, taxes, and government. In addition, Puerto Rico, Guam, American Samoa, and the Virgin Islands are represented in the U.S. Hause of Representatives by elected delegates. The delegates may vote in House committees and on all matters except the final passage of legislation.

The District of Columbia is a federal district, set aside by the Constitution as

the nation's capital. In 1964, District citizens were granted the right to vote in Presidential elections. In 1971, their delegate got a seat in the House of Representatives. Rithough they have had an elected local government since 1973, a board created by Congress in 1995 now controls most of the city's government.

Any of the territories can petition the federal government to become a state. But only Congress has the power to admit new states. In 1993, Puerto Ricans narrowly voted to remain a commonwealth.
